# Creative Curriculum Dreams






This half term's creative curriculum theme throughout the main school has centred on *dreams*. Pupils were introduced to the theme during our inspiration day at the very start of the spring term. During this inspiration day, pupils from across the school arrived in their pyjamas and gained inspiration from immersing themselves in an interactive dreamland linked to the story *'The Emperor of Absurdia'*.

Each class arrived in the hall and tucked themselves up in bed to listen to their teacher reading a bedtime story. Part way through this, when the main character drifts off into a dream, the pupils all moved into the hall to immerse themselves in all of the interactive experiences that this character took part in when in this wonderful dream world! Examples of this included getting messy when creating bowls of 'dream cereal', decorating blue flying fish, dressing up as an array of dreamland characters as well as using their physical skills to bounce through 'blanket valley' just like in the story itself.

Throughout the half term, classes developed their understanding of this theme across the curriculum. Some of our lower school pupils have enjoyed taking part in shared readings of the text *Dreams in a* jar. These pupils have even had the opportunity to create their own dream jars before working towards developing their creative writing skills when thinking of a range of wonderful and exciting things that they would like to add to their jar to appear in their dreams.

Some of the older pupils however have used the 'Mae Amongst the Stars' text to learn about letter writing. They have applied phonic knowledge to blend sounds into words and simple sentences and learnt about the format of a letter. They used this to write their own letter of explanation to the teacher in the story, to give detail about why being an astronaut would be better than being a nurse.





### Preparation for Adulthood



In everything we do in school, we are always looking at how to best prepare our students for adulthood, from developing our skills in lower school to applying these skills in different functional learning situations in school. When our students enter the 14-19 department, there is more of a focus upon developing skills for a healthy lifestyle, skills for life at home and skills for employment and being part of the community.

In the 14-19 Department, Employability sessions take place once a week for students who it is appropriate for. This session is about preparing our young people for employment and supporting them to develop their skills and awareness of their options after Pear Tree. This term the Employability group have been looking at the principles of the Skills Builder tool and working on developing their skills in speaking and listening, developing their creativity, working on solving problems, developing resilience and remaining positive and setting goals. An example of the types of activities that have been linked were inventing a new recipe for a desert toasties. In this activity the students had to come up with an idea, create the idea and evaluate its success. When learning about problem solving, the students looked at simple problems initially, which were easy to overcome and had straightforward potential solutions. As they developed their knowledge, they then looked at complex problems, which required more in-depth thinking skills. This encouraged independent thinking skills and students were encouraged to challenge their thoughts whilst being aware that there is not always one answer to a problem.







Our students then move onto applying their learnt skills in functional work situations. The students have access to our Bistro session. These sessions encourages students to apply the principles of the skills builder in practical situations to help give even more support to developing their employability with the hopes that soon we will be able to open to the local community.

For our students who employment is not the right pathway for post Pear Tree, we focus upon developing life skills; all students have access to functional skills or independent living sessions along with a rich curriculum that offers plenty of opportunity to develop communication skills. Our sensory communication session is a multi-sensory approach, which enables our students to control the world around them and encourages them to express their preferences by accessing sessions such as sensory story, cooking and attention autism. All of these sessions are curated around developing independence in communication and preparing our students for their next steps in life.



### Open Afternoon

We will be holding our Open Afternoons again next half term. This is a wonderful opportunity for you to spend some time in class to observe and support some learning activities alongside the class team. Following the time in class, we will be hosting a Computing session for parents, which will demonstrate ways in which you can support your child to keep safe online and also an opportunity for you to observe the different resources we use within school to support our Computing curriculum. I know that this will be a very informative and engaging event, and look forward to seeing you there.



### Parent Governor

We are still looking to recruit a parent to join our Governing Body. Being a Parent Governor will involve attending 6 meetings throughout the year and working alongside the school to ensure our children receive the best education possible. Parent Governors are vital in ensuring that all parents are given a voice within the strategic direction and planning of the school.
